Many state officers from the Allerton, Alden, Bradford and Tilley colonies were present to say hello and welcome Governor General Bob Davis and his charming wife Jean. It was rewarding to have such a good representation at this rather impromptu gathering.

Governor General Bob Davis spoke about his goals of the General Mayflower Society and of the progress and good rapport being made with the Wampanoag Indians by Duane Cline.\* Emphasis was placed on the importance of our junior membership, and members were encouraged to enroll their children and grandchildren.

The Standish Colony thanked Governor General Bob Davis for attending and announced that in his honor a second Alden silver book would be donated to the Naples Library in his name.

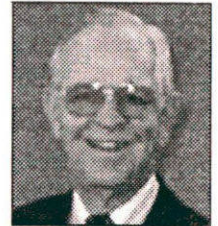
### About Our Governor General:

Robert Ellis Davis was born 13 January 1930 in Norwich, CT, the son of Emery Hatch and Edith Adelaide (Ellis) Davis. He graduated in 1947 from Norwich Free Academy and from the University of Connecticut in 1951 majoring in Industrial Management.

In September 1951, he married Jeanne Louise Clark and they have two daughters, a son, and four grandchildren.

He joined the Society of Mayflower Descendants in the State of Delaware in 1977 and was State Treasurer, State Governor, Assistant General, Deputy Governor General and Captain General. His Mayflower lines are John Alden, William Mullins, George Soule, and Stephen Hopkins and he is a member of both the Alden and Soule Kindred's.

## Who is the Oldest Member of the Society?

That very question was raised after the recent publicity of Mrs. Hazel Luther, a Florida resident and member of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants,

who died in Daytona Beach on January 31, 2003 at the age of 113. The Elizabeth Tilley Colony believes they have the oldest and most active member in Florida. Her name is **Lois Bartlett Tracy** (pictured to the left), a descendant of Pilgrim Richard Warren and a charter member of the Elizabeth Tilley Colony. She remains an active member of her Colony and community at the age of 101.

Lois is a well-known artist in her hometown of Englewood, FL, where she still exhibits her

paintings of "outer space." In 1993, The Sarasota Herald-Tribune ran an article about her painting titled "Textural Space, 1947," which had been accepted into the collection of the New York Metropolitan Museum of Art. The newspaper article also reported on some of her other accomplishments, such as her Gold Medal win at the New York's World Fair in 1936. She has won about a 100 awards in competitions nationwide.

Lois, the oldest of three sisters, was elected to the Florida Society of Mayflower Descendants on 17 March 1982. On 24 March 1982, Lois and her sisters Leah Bartlett Lasbury and Ruth Bartlett Kukyendall signed the charter organizing the Elizabeth Tilley Colony in Sarasota, Florida.

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## Message from the Governor

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Because I was fortunate enough to serve in our armed forces for four years in the U.S. Navy during the Korean War, (Having been born in 1928, I was just too young to serve in World War II though my Father served in the U.S. Army in France during World War I.) — I fight barefoot in the snow so you may have the freedom to vote and you stay at home because it is raining.

— I left my family destitute to give you the freedom of speech and you remain silent on critical issues because it might be bad for your business.

— I orphaned my children to give you a government to serve you and it has taken democracy from you.

— It's the Soldier, not the reporter, who gives you the freedom of the press.

— It's the Soldier, not the poet, who gives you the freedom of speech.

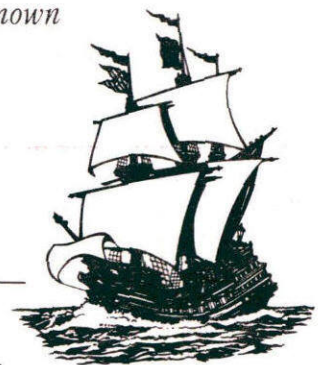
— It's the Soldier, not the campus organizer, who gives you the ability to demonstrate.

— It's the Soldier who serves and salutes the Flag and whose coffin is draped with the Flag, the same Soldier who thinks so highly of freedom that a protestor may burn the Flag.

As a Soldier, I ask: Lord, please hold our troops in your loving hands, protect them as they protect us, and bless them and their families for the selfless acts they perform for us in our time of need. Amen.

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## New Scholarship Program

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**Purpose.** The Scholarship Program is designed to recognize those students, who have demonstrated high academic objectives and achievements in addition to direct lineage to a Mayflower passenger.

**Objective.** Florida Society Scholarship Program financially awards a deserving student, who has demonstrated a respect for patriotism and the institution of American Freedom.

**Eligibility/Requirements.** Applicants must meet the following requirements:

1. Twelfth grade student.
2. An unweighted GPA of at least 3.0
3. A citizen of the United States.
4. Proven ancestry to a Mayflower passenger. The sponsoring relative must be a member of the Florida Society of Mayflower Descendants.
5. Completed application with a 400-500 word essay on the Pilgrims, and a photo of yourself to be forwarded to the State Deputy Governor before January 1st.
6. Submission of high school transcript.

7. Submission of two letters of recommendation from non-relatives, one letter from a high school official.

**Funding.** The Scholarship Program will be established and maintained by voluntary contributions from Florida Society members, colonies or other appropriate sources. The State Treasurer will be responsible for managing the assets of the Scholarship Fund and will report to the State Board of Assistants.

**Awards.** Cash awards of \$1,000 will be presented to each student the State Board of Assistants designates as a recipient. However, the amount awarded may be increased or decreased depending on the balance in the Scholarship Fund by the State Board of Assistants. Formal presentation of award(s) will be made to the student(s) at the Spring Board of Assistants meeting in April.

In Summary, all Florida Society members are invited to donate to this worthy cause and to recommend to their Colony Scholarship Chairperson any family members who meet the eligibility requirements.

# Common Mayflower and Pilgrim Myths

**MYTH: The Pilgrims stole the land for their Colony from the Indians, and mistreated them.**

**ANSWER:** The Pilgrims arrived and found a place to settle, called Plymouth on Captain John Smith's map of 1614. The native Indians called the area

Patuxet. The Patuxet tribe had been completely wiped out in a 1618 plague (probably tuberculosis or smallpox). The only Patuxet survivor was Tisquantum, more commonly called "Squanto" (who had been in England at the time of the plague). Squanto was accepted into the Plymouth Colony and acted as interpreter and negotiator with Massasoit and the Wampanoag confederation of tribes — the Pilgrims nearest neighbors. The Wampanoag do not appear to have expressed any objections to the Pilgrims' settlement in the early years, and in fact they paid Plymouth regular visits and offered their assistance in many other ways; Plymouth frequently returned those favors. Tensions between the Wampanoag and Plymouth Colony did not start to foment until after the deaths of Massasoit and his son Moosam (alias Wamsutta, also known as "Alexander" to the English) in the 1660s. The Plymouth Colony attacked a group of Massachusetts Indians in 1622 near present-day Boston, following the revelation they were joining together to expel the English at Wessagussett and Plymouth; and they joined with other New England colonies in various conflicts with other Indian groups including the Pequot (1637) and Narragansett (1640s). The Plymouth Colony did not take up arms against the Wampanoag until the 1676 war known as King Philip's War.

**MYTH: The Mayflower passengers always wore black and white clothes, without any color, and had big buckles.**

**ANSWER:** When a Mayflower passenger died, an inventory of the person's estate was taken by the Court, for purposes of probate. These

inventories show that John Howland had two red waistcoats. William Bradford had a green gown, a violet cloak, a lead-colored suit with silver buttons, and a red waistcoat. And William Brewster had green pants, a red cap, and a violet coat. Black, white, grey, and brown were by far the most common colors worn by the Pilgrims, but they were definitely not the only colors.

The Pilgrims did not have buckles on their clothing, shoes, or hats. Buckles did not come into fashion until the late 1600s — more appropriate for the Salem Witchcraft Trials time period than for the Pilgrims' time period.

**MYTH: The Mayflower made a second voyage to America.**

**ANSWER:** The Mayflower that brought the Pilgrims to America was never used again as a passenger ship. From its return in April 1621 until the death of its master Christopher Jones in March 1622, it resumed its former occupation as a trading vessel. After Christopher Jones' death, the ship sat in harbor slowly decaying while it was in probate. Christopher Jones gave his part of the ship to his widow, Josian, and in 1624 an inventory of the Mayflower was taken. It is described as being "in ruin", and valued at £128-08-04 (a ship of its size should have been worth more than £700 pounds). Ships in this condition were typically broken up and sold for scrap wood — an extremely valuable commodity in England at the time.

**MYTH: The Mayflower passengers were mostly old men.**

**ANSWER:** This is one of the most prevailing stereotypes, due mainly to the 19th century artwork depicting the Pilgrims. It couldn't be further from the truth. The average age of a Mayflower passenger was 32. The oldest Mayflower passenger, James Chilton, was 64. Only five of the 104 Mayflower passengers were over 50 — and only fourteen Mayflower passengers were over 40. About 60 passengers were between 20 and 40 years old. At least 30 passengers were under the age of 17.

As for a gender breakdown, there were 51 men, 22 boys, 20 women, and 11 girls. The oldest Mayflower passenger still alive to partake in the first Thanksgiving was William Brewster, at the age of 54.

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## In Heartfelt Sympathy

I have received notification that Mr. Leo Styer, husband of Betty Styer, Tilley Colony, passed away Sunday, 27 April 2003.

Any of you who were active in the State Society and attended State and Triennial meetings these past few years, know Betty and Leo as an inseparable couple, who never missed a meeting until this year when health problems prevented them from doing so.

Many of you don't know or remember that Betty Styer was first a member of the Gov. William Bradford Colony. I first met Betty and Leo in November 1978, when both Betty and I became members of Bradford Colony, and we sat together at our first luncheon, and all luncheons after that until Lou and I were transferred to Nürnberg, Germany in 1981.

During those years, anyone from the Sarasota area who wished to belong to the Florida Mayflower Society and attend a Mayflower meeting had to belong either to Myles Standish Colony in Naples, or Bradford Colony in St. Petersburg. Betty noticed there were quite a few members of Bradford who came up from the Sarasota area, and immediately, the wheels began turning...why not establish a colony in Sarasota! Betty set about finding out how to charter a new colony, and started to gather enough members to start one. By 1982, the deed was done. Mrs. Frank Davis was State Governor and Bill Staples was Colony Governor, Bradford Colony at the time Tilley Colony was chartered in 1982. Being a descendant of John Howland and Elizabeth Tilley, Betty decided to name "her" new Colony after the distaff side of her ancestry, Elizabeth Tilley.

Betty was never idle; she wrote a book on her home town, a book on Elizabeth Tilley, and many more things. After being a Colony Governor, Betty became State Historian, and by the time I was back in Tampa in 1988, she had just been installed as the new Governor, Florida State Society.

In 1996, when the Florida State Newsletter needed an Editor; Betty again, took up the slack, and took on the responsibility and did a wonderful job until her health forced her to resign from that task last Fall 2002.

The Florida Society of Mayflower Descendants family send our sincere condolences to Betty and her family on Leo's passing. He was such a fine gentleman who will be missed by all of us!

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## Life Memberships

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A life membership application can be obtained from your colony treasurer. The member must have belonged to the Florida Society for one year before applying.

The life membership fee is based according to your age:

65 +	\$350	35-49	\$550
50-64	\$450	under 35	\$600

Please keep in mind that Florida life memberships cannot be transferred to another state. They are only valid in the State of Florida as other states have different fees.

Also, the member must pay dues for one year after applying for life membership, since the life membership fee doesn't generate enough interest to cover dues for at least a year. Florida had 98 life members as of November 2002.

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## Junior Memberships

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Junior memberships are for children of any age up to 18 years old. "Any member in good standing in the State Society may make an application for junior membership on behalf of any person under 18 years of age who has a proven lineage, meaning that the Junior is related to a past or present member of the Society by blood through the same line of descent through which the member was approved by the Society. Applications can be obtained from the Colony Junior Membership Chairperson and returned to the same for processing after completion by the sponsor. The applicant for enrollment shall not be required to complete lineage papers or prove descent." The application and sponsor's check of \$15 (payable to the State Treasurer) should be returned to the Colony Junior Membership Chairperson.

Junior members may transfer between the ages of 18 and 25, to a regular membership in the State Society in which the junior membership is held. The usual lineage papers have to be furnished and approved, either prior to or at the time of the application from junior to regular membership. No initiation fee will be required.

# The Pink Book Dilemma

The Florida State Society's present policy is to provide each member with a triennial membership directory (aka pink book) that contains information on its by-laws, state officers, and all of the colonies' officers and members. The process of gathering and updating information begins in November-December of the year when there is change of officers. The State Secretary and State Historian spend the next 60 days coordinating with the colonies to compile an up-to-date list of all members and to verify addresses. The next 30 days are spent in preparation for printing. The books are then distributed at the Spring Board of Assistants' meeting held in April for a total lapse of time of 5 to 6 months!

## *The disadvantages of our current method include:*

1. **Printing and Mailing Costs.** The process is too slow, impractical and inefficient. The cost has risen from \$2,507 in 1999 to \$5,952 in 2003.

2. **Quality of Information.** Outdated information because the book is printed every third year. There is also an 8-month gap between the gathering of information and the final distribution of the book to individual members. Printing more frequently is not financially feasible!

3. **Incomplete Information.** The pink book currently does not contain members' phone numbers or e-mail addresses due to their frequency of change. This argument simply is not true today. Phone numbers and e-mails would provide a rapid and more efficient means of communication between members.

## *Recommendations made to the Board include:*

1. **Discontinue.** Stop publishing the triennial edition of the statewide Society directory (pink book) in the manner in which it is currently being done.

2. **Publish at State Level.** Publish a smaller booklet containing the current Florida Society Board of Assistants, appointed officers, each colony's board of assistants with names, office held, addresses, phone numbers, e-mail to be distributed to each member of the State Society Board of Assistants and each member of each colony's Board of Assistants at Florida State Society expense.

3. **Publish at Colony Level.** Each colony publish their own directory annually with the Florida State Society helping to defray some of the cost upon approval by membership at an Annual State Meeting.

4. **Prepaid Basis.** In addition to the recommendation noted above in number two, members who desire a copy of the pink book would prepay for the book including shipping and handling fees. This would defray the cost at both the state and colony levels plus prevent the waste of unclaimed books.

Having a disclaimer/use clause was also discussed. It was determined that every directory published at any level, from this time forward should contain a clause to be determined, safeguarding the contents and emphasizing restrictions on use of the personal information within the directory expressly forbidding any use of said information for commercial purposes.

# Did You Know?

- The Pilgrims were first called “pilgrims” by Rev. Chandler Robbins in a sermon in 1793, which referenced Mayflower passenger William Bradford’s quotation from the Bible (Hebrews 11:13).
- There were 10 adult servants aboard the Mayflower and only 4 of them signed the Compact.
- Abraham Lincoln was the President that proclaimed “Thanksgiving” as a National Day of Observance in 1863.
- Native Americans declared Thanksgiving a National Day of Mourning in 1971.
- Captain John Smith only made two trips to New England – one in 1614 and the other in 1620.
- Some of the Separatists wanted to settle in Guiana (area between Orinoco and the Amazon). This location was ruled out because of the “grievous

diseases and other impediments often associated with hotter climates.”

— The original Compact document was never found, so the most authentic text of the Compact is in *Mourt’s Relation (1622)*.

— William Bradford could have been the sole owner of the Plymouth Colony, but chose to share his rights with the original settlers.

— The eastern seaboard of the United States from St. Augustine and north was referred to as Virginia in the Pilgrims’ day.
